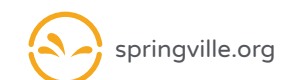
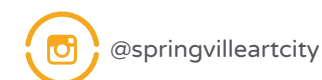

ELECTRIC BIKES AND MOTOR ASSISTED SCOOTERS—WHAT'S THE LAW?



Here are some important State of Utah laws governing things that are fun to ride. Please stay safe.

A person under eight years of age may not operate a motor

assisted scooter with the motor running on any public property, highway, path, or sidewalk.



A person may not operate a motor assisted scooter... at a speed of greater than 15 miles per hour or in violation of Subsection 41-6a-1115.1(3).

An individual under 16 years old may not operate a class 3 electric assisted bicycle, which is an electric assisted bicycle equipped with motor or electronics that:

Provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling; ceases to provide assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of 28 miles per hour; and is equipped with a speedometer.



An individual under 14 years old may not operate an electric assisted bicycle with the electric motor engaged on any public property, highway, path, or sidewalk unless the individual is under the direct supervision of the individual's parent or guardian.

An individual under eight years old may not operate an electric assisted bicycle with the electric motor engaged on any public property, highway, path, or sidewalk.

As a general rule, in order to legally drive a motor vehicle on a roadway, the vehicle must be registered and equipped with all required safety equipment (headlamps, tail lamps, license plate, turn signals, horn, and a lot more). Go-karts are typically not street legal.

A person operating a bicycle or a vehicle or device propelled by human power shall:



- yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian; and
- give an audible signal before overtaking and passing a pedestrian.

CALL THE POWER DEPARTMENT

Are you thinking of upgrading the amperage or changing out the meter base to your house? Here's what to do step by step.

1. Find a licensed electrician to assess what needs to be done. To check if an electrician has a current license go to the Utah Div of Occupational & Professional Licensing at secure.utah.gov/llv/search/index.html.



2. Call the Power Dept at 801.489.2750 to obtain an electrical assessment fee form. We will be able to tell you how much money it will cost and we can either email the form to you or you can pick it up.

3. Take the form to the Community Development Department on the 2nd floor of the Springville Civic Center at 110 S. Main Street or call 801.491.7861 or 801.489.2704 where they will start the permit process. Keep in mind that they may have additional fees not included in the Power Department fees. You must set up an appointment for a building inspection. This must be done before the Power Department can reconnect your service.

4. If you require the power to be disconnected, call the Power Department at least 3-5 days before you plan on doing the work. This allows us time to schedule an available technician or lineman.

5. After all the work has been done, call the Community Development Department and set an appointment to have the Building Inspector inspect the new service installed.

6. We will receive the inspection report and dispatch a technician or lineman to inspect and reconnect the power to the house.

Lots of steps but everything runs smoothly when everyone is in the loop. STORM DRAIN WATCH

Springville City is committed to keeping our storm-water clean. We also try to minimize the risk of property damage due to flooding. There are, however, many challenges. Although the City regularly sweeps streets and cleans storm drains and sumps, we still need your help. Leaves and grass clippings can plug storm-water inlets and cause localized flooding. Please help us by not blowing your leaves and clippings out to the street and into the gutters.

PLEASE DO YOUR PART

- Compost leaves & grass.
- Sweep don't blow driveways, sidewalks, & gutters.
- Recycle used oil & antifreeze.
- Pick up, bag & properly dispose of pet waste.
- Report illegal dumping by calling 801.491.2780.

Together we can keep our lakes, rivers, & drinking water clean, and uncontaminated.

Storm water also carries pollutants such as hydrocarbons and heavy metals deposited on streets by cars, pesticide/herbicide residue, and anything that anyone dumps in the storm-water system.

In addition, pollutants can be washed down the gutter into the storm-water system when people hose off their driveways and sidewalks, wash their cars in the driveway, and fail to correct sprinklers that spray into the sidewalks, driveways, and streets.

RE-FRAMING DOWNTOWN
